I was born on July 26, 1948 in St Louis, MO. to Walter and Kitty Kreyling. I was raised as an only child, only to learn in my teen years that I had a half-sister in England. I finally got to meet my sister in 1975 when she moved to St Louis from England via Australia. I lived in the same house in south St Louis that my dad was raised in until I went in the Army in 1968. I went to Woodward Elementary School, and graduated from Cleveland High School in June 1966. On May 1, 1966, I went to a party at a minister's house and met the girl who would turn out to be the love of my life. On July 26, I went to work for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. as a Cable splicer. In October 1967 we got engaged, and then I got drafted. I went in the Army in January 1968. Basic training was at Ft. Leonard Wood, then on to infantry AIT (Advance Individual Training) at Ft Polk, Louisiana while there my Military Specialty (MOS) was changed to lineman and I went to Ft Bragg, NC.

On February 25, 1969 I arrived in Vietnam and my MOS was once again changed to cable splicer. My tour in Nam was shortened on April 25th when a blow torch blew up and I was burned. Two days later I left for the 106th hospital in Japan.

A place of honor

The Grand Union Flag



British Merchant and War vessels in the Colonial period flew a red flag with the famous British Union Jack in the canton. This was known widely throughout the Colonies and it is not surprising that it was the design chosen to be modified when the first distinctive American National Flag was created.

By adding white stripes across the field, the number of Colonies struggling for their rights were symbolized. The Union Jack indicated that independence was not yet demanded.

On January 1st, 1776, Worshipful Brother George Washington, after having achieved a semblance of military order, with a limited number of troops, proclaimed the formation of the Continental Army at his Headquarters on Prospect Hill in Somerville, Massachusetts, and hoisted the Grand Union Flag on a 70 foot mast in defiance of the British watching from Boston. The Grand Union Flag is also referred to as the "Continental Colors."

Don't drink and drive

Interesting phrases commonly used

Did you know the saying "God willing and the Creek don't rise" was in reference to the Creek Indians and not a body of water? It was written by Benjamin Hawkins in the late 18th century. He was a politician and Indian diplomat. While in the south, Hawkins was requested by the President of the U.S. to return to Washington. In his response, he was said to write, "God willing and the Creek don't rise." Because he capitalized the word "Creek" it is deduced that he was referring to the Creek Indian tribe and not a body of water.

In George Washington's days, there were no cameras. One's image was either sculpted or painted. Some paintings of George Washington showed him standing behind a desk with one arm behind his back while others showed both legs and both arms. Prices charged by painters were not based on how many people were to be painted, but by how many limbs were to be painted. Arms and legs are 'limbs,' therefore painting them would cost the buyer more. Hence the expression, "Okay, but it'll cost you an arm and a leg." (Artists know hands and arms are more difficult to paint)

As incredible as it sounds, men and women took baths only *twice a year* (May and October). Women kept their hair covered, while men shaved their heads (because of lice and bugs) and wore wigs. Wealthy men could afford good wigs made from wool. They couldn't wash the wigs, so to clean them they would carve out a loaf of bread, put the wig in the shell, and bake it for 30 minutes. The heat would make the wig big and fluffy, hence the term 'big wig...' Today we often use the term "here comes the Big Wig" because someone appears to be or is powerful and wealthy.

In the late 1700's, many houses consisted of a large room with only one chair. Commonly, a long wide board folded down from the wall, and was used for dining. The 'head of the household' always sat in the chair while everyone else ate sitting on the floor. Occasionally a guest, who was usually a man, would be invited to sit in this chair during a meal. To sit in the chair meant you were important and in charge. They called the one sitting in the chair the 'chair man.' Today in business, we use the expression or title "Chairman" or "Chairman of the Board."

Personal hygiene left much room for improvement. As a result, many women and men had developed acne scars by adulthood. The women would spread bee's wax over their facial skin to smooth out their complexions. When they were speaking to each other, if a woman began to stare at another woman's face she was told, 'mind your own bee's wax.' Should the woman smile, the wax would crack, hence the term 'crack a smile'. In addition, when they sat too close to the fire, the wax would melt.... Therefore, the expression "losing face."

Early politicians required feedback from the public to determine what the people considered important. Since there were no telephones, TV's or radios, the politicians sent their assistants to local taverns, pubs, and bars? They were told to 'go sip some Ale and listen to people's conversations and political concerns. Many assistants were dispatched at different times. 'You go sip here' and 'You go sip there.' The two words 'go sip' were eventually combined when referring to the local opinion and, thus we have the term "gossip."
